



- What does a modified pod practice and/or conditioning look like for your group?
 Shotgun Sports Games Explanations:
 - American Trap:
 - A trap field consists of a single trap machine located in a house partially buried in the ground. There are <u>5 shooting positions</u> located behind the house <u>on an arc 16 yards behind the house</u> and <u>spaced 3 yards (9 feet) apart from each other</u>. The most common game of trap, singles, is played from these positions. From each of these positions, a lane or sidewalk marked in increments to 27 yards extends back away from the center of the trap house. The game of handicap is played from these yardage markers. Competitors will shoot five targets at each station. - American Skeet:



• Dotted lines in the Skeet field diagram below are all that remain to hint at Skeet's early days, but they serve to



illustrate the game's total dependence on the original circle for its very form and existence. For the geometric-minded, the working area of a Skeet field is actually a sector of a large circle formed by the target flight paths originating from each side of the circumference and meeting in the circle's center at the target crossing point. The entire circle's circumference is 395.84 feet and its area is 12,468.982 square feet -- or almost three-tenths of an acre. The sector's area is 5,091.501 square feet -- or slightly over one-tenth of an acre. Competitors wait in line at each station, until everyone shoots the station. The group then rotates to the next station.

Clays:

Sporting clays the closest thing to actual field

shooting of all shotgun sports. Rather than having clay birds thrown from standardized distances and angles as with skeet or trap, sporting clays courses are designed to simulate the hunting of ducks, pheasants, other upland birds, and even rabbits. Since there is no set season and it can be shot at any time, many hunters shoot sporting clays to further their wingshooting skills during the offseason. Targets may be thrown from any angle or distance to simulate wingshooting, and six different sizes of clay targets are used to further give the shooter the experience of actual hunting conditions. Sporting clays is typically shot in squads of two to six people and played over a course of 10 to 15 shooting stations laid around fields or around the natural features of the land. The course designer is not limited in target speed, angle, or distance, so every course is different. To shoot a round of sporting clays, you will start on the assigned first station and shoot each station in order. Before the first person in every squad shoots, the referee will show your squad the targets, so you'll be familiar with what and how the targets are being thrown and strategize how you'll shoot them. When the previous squad has finished shooting a station and its your squads turn to shoot, hand your scorecard to the referee. When your turn comes up to shoot, be ready. Step up to the station. Then and only then do you load your shotgun. Point it safely toward the target firing area. When your gun is ready and you are in position, relax and call pull. Sporting clays fields tend to be the most spaced out stations of any game. Below is an example of a sporting clays field and station.



- 5-Stand:
 - NSCA 5-STAND Sporting events consist of targets shot in 25 bird increments from five shooting stands with each shooter rotating from station to station. The game offers several different skill levels and utilizes six or eight automatic traps to simulate game birds. Targets are released in a predetermined set sequence marked on a menu card in front of each shooting cage. Targets are registered separately under a special set of rules; however, they utilize the NSCA Classification system and all targets are included for total targets shot for the year. NSCA 5-STAND Sporting rules must always be followed while conducting this event. This event is a mix of American Trap and Sporting clays. It has the stations and rotation structure of American trap. The targets are more similar to sporting clays.

research of John Lednicky. Being outdoors, and over 6 feet away makes this game particularly safe. The game is also controlled by voice activated throwers. There can be no personal interaction once the game is set up.

- American Skeet and Sporting Clays involve individual stations that a group rotates to. We will separate the group into a longer line than normal. Instead of standing in a ten-foot line, we will stand in a fifty-foot line. A group of 5 competitors can be in each round. If we need additional spacing, it should be able to be done.
- 5-Stand is very similar to American trap, but the distances are not uniform. We will need to check our local range and measure the distancing. By my estimate, the distance should be roughly 7-feet.
- Each Pod can be modified to include the members of our club who participate in a discipline together. For example, all of the members who shoot skeet first will

stay together as a group and shoot trap together next round. We can implement these pods all semester, so those groups are always together. These pods can also always travel in the same car together.

- There will be at least one Pod leader (an officer) in each pod.
- The club will provide hand sanitizer for each pod to use during practices.
- Members will not engage in large gatherings of any kind.
- Members will not be going out in public without a mask on under any circumstances, even when we are not together and having practices.
- If we cannot have practices at Pajaro Gun Club, Preston (one of our coaches) has a dryfire system that we can set up and have one or two members come out at a time to use.
- Does your club have a direct relationship with a national umbrella organization? If so, what's your competition schedule projected to be this fall? Do they have any expectations for your operations that must be included in your planning?
 - ACUI is our National Governing Body and they have announced that all of their scheduled shoots are going to be virtual. This means that shooters can go to their local ranges and record their scores themselves and mail them in. This eliminates large groups meeting up and clusters of people from different places possibly infecting each other.
 - Because our shoots are virtual, we can still participate. The club can cover the costs of mailing in scores. This also eliminates travel fees and other expenses along with traveling.
 - ACUI expects everyone to follow CDC guidelines and social distance with a minimum of 6 feet. We will also be wearing masks to lessen the chance of transmission between people and using hand sanitizer.
 - Our fall semester is normally not as busy as our spring semester. We will maybe be able to participate in one or two virtual shoots this semester.
- <u>What infrastructure will your organization put in place in order to meet the expectation</u> that all in-person activities track attendance?
 - One of our officers will be taking attendance and asking everybody:
 - Have you had a fever of 100.4 F or greater in the last 2 days?
 - Have you had a cough, difficulty breathing, sore throat, or loss of taste or smell?
 - Have you had contact with a person known to be infected with COVID-19 within the previous 14 days?
 - We will have an excel sheet that gets updated every time we have practice for attendance. It will be located in our One Drive (or Outlook). Laura, Jonathan, and Shandon will be able to access it easily. If that doesn't work, we can just email them the attendance document after every practice.
- If your organization typically requires transportation to club practices off-campus, how will you navigate safety practices?

- We will limit the capacity in each car to 4 persons. They will need to wear masks the entire car ride in order to keep everybody in the car safe. I would like to have an officer in each car that will implement this rule.
- We will also have the same "pod" travel together in each car.
- We will sanitize the cars with Clorox wipes before and after each use of the vehicle.
